Our trained Coaches conduct regular play-based learning activities with children in schools. Equipped with tangible learning outcomes, these activities are instrumental in the holistic development of children and inculcate essential life skills such as cooperation, communication, better listening, critical thinking, confidence and conflict resolution

Right To Play was invited to participate in a meeting chaired by Chief Minister and share the experience of introducing play-based learning methodology in selected schools of KP. This meeting was in recognition of Right To Play's work in the KP province since 2008.

Over 1500 government school teachers have been trained by Right To Play in KP. Right To Play engaged 133,000 children and youth in play-based learning programme in 200 schools of the province during 2015. Over 50% of the beneficiaries of the programme are girls.

Early Childhood Development Through Play

Early Childhood Education training of trainers jointly organised by Reform Support Unit Sindh and Right To Play in Hyderabad & Sukkur. The training will help teachers to setup ECE classrooms and integrate PLAY in teaching practices in schools of Sindh

Early childhood is a crucial stage of life in terms of a child's physical, intellectual, emotional and social development. In recent years, researchers have learned that early education can play a critical role during this important developmental period. Play-based activities in early childhood education can help to break down the barriers for learning.

For the implementation of ECE programme in selected schools of Sindh, Right To Play and RSU jointly organised a training in Hyderabad and Sukkur for 54 female master teacher trainers. These teachers were nominated by RSU from all over the province for this training.

The four day training programme in each location trained teachers to understand ECE and setup classrooms and integrate PLAY in teaching practices. The training was designed in the context of National ECE Curriculum 2007 which emphasizes to achieve holistic child development through ECE. Teachers were trained on purpose and effective use of ECE in classrooms,

different types and importance of play in early years for child development.

Mr. Nisar Ahmed Khuhro, Senior Minister for Education & Literacy, Sindh was the chief guest at the closing ceremony in Hyderabad. Dr. Muhammad Memon, Mr. Qamer Shahid Siddiqui, Director General Provincial Institute of Teachers Education (P.I.T.E) Sindh and Mr. Mushtaq Ahmed Shahani, Director Bureau of Curriculum and Extension Wing Sindh were among the distinguished guests of the ceremony. The Minister appreciated the efforts of RSU and Right To Play for conducting this training.

Global Dignity Day is an international day for dignity, observed on October 20 every year in a number of countries all over the world.

A Dignity Day event is a two-hour course held at a school at which teachers present the concept of dignity and invite children to discuss what dignity means for them. Children also share stories about dignity from their own experience.

The aim is to equip children with the tools to use dignity as a guiding principle for their actions - and to recognise the significance of how living a life based on dignity can have a positive impact on both their own lives and the lives of others. The concept of "dignity" stems from the principle that all human beings have intrinsic worth.

This inalienable value belongs to all of us simply by virtue of our being human. Our dignity is strengthened when we feel that our rights and freedom are respected and when we live in a situation where we can make choices and take actions that enhance our self-respect, integrity and humanity.

Play for the Advancement of Quality Education - PAQE

Right To Play is implementing The Play for Advancement of Quality Education (PAQE) in 8 districts of Sindh and Khyber Pakhtunkhwa which include Peshawar, Mardan, Mansehra, Thatta, Sanghar, Khairpur and Umerkot.

Funded by the Government of Canada through the Department of Foreign Affairs, Trade and Development (DFATD), PAQE aims to improve educational attainment with a child friendly approach to learning with play. The PAQE project will focus on training of teachers and coaches, safer school and learning environment, advocacy for the protection of children especially girls from violence and abuse in schools and community. These issues will be addressed through Right To Play's child-centered and play-based approach.

Ms. Sarwat Ghias, a teacher from Mansehra who is also a Right To Play's volunteer, represented Pakistan in the annual fundraising event Big Red Ball of Right To Play in UK. Ms. Sarwat is an instructor at Regional Institute of Teachers' Training (RITE) Mansehra, Khyber Pakhtunkhwa.

Ms. Sarwat made an impressive speech there and shared her experience of being a trained teacher by Right To Play. She shared with a large audience that how sport and play programme by Right To Play in her district is bringing a positive behaviour change among children.

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Generation Amazing constructed football grounds in Karachi, Thatta and Mardan. Generation Amazing programme is including 6000 children from these communities through Football For Development

“This surface is certainly much better than the streets” shared a footballer who participated in the football match at the launching ceremony of Generation Amazing football ground in Karachi. First of its kind in Pakistan, an international level turf have been installed in the ground which was the center of attraction for football fanatics and players. Generation Amazing which is a legacy program of Supreme Committee of Delivery and Legacy Qatar. Generation Amazing has rehabilitated 3 community football pitches in Pakistan.

In 2010, Qatar succeeded in its bid to host the 2022 FIFA World Cup. As part of this winning bid, the organizer of the mega event in Qatar, Supreme Committee for Delivery and Legacy, launched the Generation Amazing program in partnership with Right To Play, to inspire a new generation of young people, encouraging them to harness the positive power of football to promote peaceful, healthy development in communities around the world. It was created to harness the power of football to support the positive, healthy development of individuals and communities.

Currently in 2015, in its second phase, Generation Amazing Program implemented by Right To Play aims to “build a global movement of coaches and youth leaders who harness the power of football to support the positive, healthy development of individuals and communities.” The two main components of this Phase are 1) Rehabilitation of safe play spaces; and 2) The commencement of long term community development programming focused on youth development through using, primarily, Right to Play’s innovative Football For Development program resource.

Completing its objective, Generation Amazing Program in Pakistan rehabilitated three football pitches each in Thatta, Karachi and Mardan. The process of rehabilitation has been completed and all three football pitches are now open for youth and children of the respective communities without any discrimination.

“We don’t have to pay any fee to play in this ground”, shared Fida, a local footballer in Thatta. These football pitches will particularly serve the underprivileged children in these communities. Around 6000 children and youth, both boys and girls, will be the beneficiaries of these facilities in Thatta, Mardan and Karachi.

Generation Amazing aims to empower young children to be leaders and create positive change in their communities using the power of football. Coach trainers engage children in Football for Development activities on a regular basis and inculcate basic life skills.
