





- The World Health Organization on Friday said that the NeoCov coronavirus, was discovered by Chinese scientists. Coronaviruses are a large family of viruses that can cause diseases ranging from the common cold to Severe Acute Respiratory Syndrome (SARS). The WHO said that it is aware of the development, but the virus requires further study to ascertain if it poses a risk to humans. Read more

ACCEPTING THE UNACCEPTED: TRANSFORMING TOWARDS SUSTAINABLE LIVELIHOODS

STORY OF A MAN WHO LOOKS ON BRIGHT SIDE OF LIFE DARKNESS

We often read about or hear of how big suppliers and brands success stories started from a small shop or small workplace. The founders of these companies could not afford to start from a large workspace right off the bat. Over time, they built the companies into corporate behemoths with sprawling offices. Although there is a difference in scale, stories of in District Peshawar entrepreneurship are similar to successful businesses that started in small shops or tiny workspaces.

"Yes, I know that was hard and a lot of work to do but I never give up. At earlier I was scared about how to manage the resources. What can I say, that is life. Besides, look on the bright side: You get to do what you want, and you get to do it your way. There is just one catch. You have to start somewhere. Ideas and opportunities don't just materialize out of thin air." Jehanzeb

Mr. Jehanzeb, the resident of village Azad Khan Kalay Union Council Panam Dheri District Peshawar KP. He has 2 wives and 14 children. He is running a small shop in front of his house and greasing his family palms by providing them food, clothing, and other daily routine use things.

SIF conducted a comprehensive assessment at different locations of district Peshawar i.e., Azad Khan Kalay, Chandan Qala, Hindu Kasay, KhanKhail Sarkha, Azeem Khan Sarkha, Neway Kalay, Ghari Sadu, Khat kalay, Dheray Kalay, Ghari Sherdad, Patwar Payan, Maghdarzai Palosi and Mushtarzai for selection of entrepreneur's shopkeepers selected from districts Peshawar. These livelihood beneficiaries were assessed and identified using a defined tool that was defined by the program team and vetted by the MEAL department through program staff. The tool was comprised of defined criteria and standards to choose and select the beneficiaries. Based on the defined criteria through a comprehensive exercise, SIF field teams identified and finalized 25-livelihood beneficiaries' shopkeepers and engaged them in the provision of the Ramadan Food Pack during 2021.

Mr. Jehanzeb started his shop business in 2001; He was working out of a very small shop. He was running his business in a mud house shop. He also had bad debts and faced a huge cash crunch. But when the SIF team visited him and discussed the project and modality and convinced by their idea that he could provide SIF Ramadan food items big chucks locally (with his village). SIF conviction and determination helped Jehanzeb overcome insurmountable odds and become the medium type of supplier of food commodities to SIF beneficiaries.

Mr. Jehanzeb now scales up his running business of shop and constructed two additional rooms one for shop and one for storeroom where he is currently running his shop. He earned a profit of 1,95,000/- PKRs. He got this profit by providing Ramadan food packs and investing 12.6 million PKRs. to SIF beneficiaries.

STORY OF A MAN WHO LOOKS ON BRIGHT SIDE OF LIFE DARKNESS

One day, Mr. Jehanzeb heard that SIF going to implement the project to support livelihood beneficiaries' small businesspeople (shopkeepers) from target villages of Union Council Panam Dheri to providing their business opportunity by supplying Ramadan Food Packs with mobilization advance to project beneficiaries in his village.

Jehanzeb took the challenge upon himself, and with the help of close friends and family, Jehanzeb managed to collect the amount to make the initial deposit to purchased out the required and specified food commodities in the shop. In the process, he had to start to visited big markets it was the first time when he experiences bargaining with the big supplier as well as procuring the big chunks of supplies too. Putting his head and fortunes together he started to accomplish the with his son and procuring the food commodities as per SIF designated food packs caseload shop in Azad Khan Kalay, Jehanzeb began his journey as a supplying the food packs by investing 1.26 million PKRs.

Within three to fifteen days, Mr. Jehanzeb prepared Ramadan Food Packs as per SIF requirement and distributed them to Ramadan beneficiaries which leaving him amazed. From that point, there was no looking back. Jehanzeb grew his business as well as constructed two rooms one for shop one for storeroom and earned 1,95,000 PKRs profit too.

SIF initially brought these small level shopkeepers on board and their capacity built through business management & marketing strategies pieces of training and explored an exposure for them to develop and encourage their interest towards sustainable business. They motivated for incremental stages of business and provided a business opportunity to supplying Ramadan Food Packs for SIF-designed Ramadan activity. Their first journey started when they engaged to procure food commodities for Ramadan beneficiaries in district Peshawar.

"When a person does not have his heart in something, he doesn't have the necessary drivers for it." said Jehanzeb.

SIF project core objective is to scale-up up these small level entrepreneurs' businesses, at a broader level in a systematic way. SIF capacitated them through technical support about marketing, business management, and bragging power. They guided and oriented how, where, and when to procure food commodities. SIF continued to refine these entrepreneur shopkeeper business art and made them skilled and capable individuals. One of the first breakthroughs for them occurred when they were provided the business opportunity to supply Ramadan Food commodities to SIF beneficiaries in 2021. This exposure and recognition allowed them to landed in enhancing their business through different parameters.


