Climate Emergency in Pakistan-Flood 2022

Overview of Situation

As according to the reports of NDMA and UNOCHA

The climate emergency in Pakistan is the point of main distress at all level . Though Pakistan is enlisted among those countries who are contributing less than 1% to global emission but the

country is paying a huge prize of climate change and that is something entire world observed in recent floods in Pakistan. The unusual monsoon pattern in Pakistan caused severe devastation in many parts of the country. A total of 116 districts are badly affected by flood and 80 districts are declared as calamity hit. As per the latest statistics of NDMA, 1559 people are died and 12850 are badly injured and numerous houses, bridges, health facilities, schools, infrastructure, roads and bridges were badly destroyed in flood hit areas of Pakistan.

As per according to the recent report of Unicef, 16 million children have been badly affected by super floods and at least 3.4 million girls and boys remain in need of immediate lifesaving support. The World Health Organization (WHO) Chief also warned the world about the 2nd disaster in Pakistan related to diseases and death as concern grow over the spread of water borne disease among flood-hit area of Pakistan.

The humanitarian response is ongoing under the leadership of the Government of Pakistan, which is currently assessing damage in flood-affected areas of Balochistan, Khyber Pakhtunkhwa, Punjab and Gilgit-Baltistan. Preparations are underway for similar assessments in Sindh next week. Over PKR 25 billion (US\$ 113 million) has reportedly already been disbursed to some 1 million flood-affected households through the Benazir Income Support Programme (BISP), in Balochistan, Sindh, Khyber Pakhtunkhwa and Punjab, according to the National Disaster Management Authority (NDMA). The Government, its line ministries and the Armed Forces are also delivering aid to people in need. Around 70 national NGOs – members of the National Humanitarian Network (NHN) – have provided assistance in the form of evacuations, temporary shelters, cooked food and dry rations, non-food items (NFI), as well as health and water, sanitation and hygiene (WASH) support in most flood-affected districts. Alongside the provision of aid items and services, UN agencies are operating field offices in all four affected provinces to enable a more localized response at the provincial and district levels, and the UN is supporting the logistical and coordination pipeline for ensuring that relief items are effectively transported, stored and distributed to people in affected areas. Data collection for the Government-led multi-sectoral rapid needs assessments (RNA) is in Sindh, Khyber Pakhtunkhwa and Punjab has nearly been completed, with analysis set to begin to enable a more informed and coordinated response to urgent humanitarian needs.

Government of Pakistan established an ad hoc coordination structure NFRCC(National Flood Response and Coordination Centre) which is working very efficiently from September 1st and taking on board all relevant stakeholders on regular basis to update about response efforts at all levels. PHF member organizations started the response activities at the earliest in disaster hit areas and provided immediate rescue and relief activities that were related to shelter, food, NFIs, education, health and WASH. 40 member organizations of PHF are present in 69 districts of Pakistan and reached out 1,74,0856 people with the total financial volume of 20.14 million USD. To provide the extensive response services, PHF member organizations are mobilizing resources on immediate basis and planning for 38.45 million USD to better provide services in flood hit areas.

Islamabad, Pakistan – Water-borne diseases are a new concern in flood-ravaged Pakistan, with the authorities reporting at least nine such deaths in the last 24 hours, according to government data. All the deaths caused by diarrhoea, malaria and gastroenteritis were reported in the southeastern Sindh province where more than 300 people have died of flood-related ailments since July. *Read More*

Severe flooding in Pakistan has left tens of thousands of people sick with infectious and water-borne diseases. Women and children in rural areas are especially vulnerable to such diseases, experts say.

Flood waters have begun to recede or move away. But water may remain in places for two to six months. Stagnant water presents a serious risk to people living in the affected areas. Stagnant means water that is not flowing. <u>Read More</u>

At least nine more people have died from water-borne diseases in flood-hit areas of Pakistan, officials said on Tuesday, warning they risked losing control of the spread of infections in a crisis that the United Nations Children's Fund (Unicef) described "beyond bleak". An intense and long monsoon dumped around three times as much rain on Pakistan than on average in recent weeks, causing major flooding which killed 1,559 people, including 551 children and 318 women. according to the disaster management agency. UNITED NATIONS: "Pakistan is drowning, not only in floodwater but in debt" too, said UN Secretary General Antonio Guterres as Prime Minister Shahbaz Sharif urged the international community on Tuesday to stay engaged with the country as it deals with this huge humanitarian crisis. Pakistan and France, meanwhile, agreed to identify ways and means to support efforts to tackle the challenge caused by the floods and Paris offered to host an international conference before the end of the year to help Islamabad rebuild in a climateresilient manner. KARACHI, Pakistan, Sept 21 (Reuters) - Skin infections, diarrhoea and malaria are rampant in parts of Pakistan's flood-ravaged regions, killing 324 people, authorities said on Wednesday, adding that the situation may get out of control if required aid doesn't arrive. Hundreds of thousands of people displaced by the floods are living in the open, and as floodwaters - spread over hundreds of kilometres - may take two to six months to recede, stagnant waters have led to serious health issues. *Read More*

The overall death toll in Pakistan from the devastating floods has increased to 1,559, with 12,850 others injured, the National Disaster Management Authority (NDMA) said. In the last 24 hours, 15 new fatalities were reported, all in the worst-hit Sindh province, reports Xinhua news agency citing the NDMA as saying. The victims included a child and three women. The heavy monsoon rain-triggered flash floods since mid-June have also destroyed a total of 1,979,485 houses, while an estimated 973,632 livestock has perished in the rains across the country, according to the latest NDMA figures. UNHCR, the UN Refugee Agency, is continuing to support the government-led relief efforts in flood-hit parts of Pakistan, where the situation remains dire. Authorities and humanitarian agencies are racing against time to reach the affected population — with close to 8 million people now displaced.UNHCR continues to coordinate logistics as part of a plan to transport over 1.2 million relief items to local authorities in the most flood-affected areas. So far, we have delivered over 1 million life-saving items to authorities for distribution. In addition, all 22 scheduled UNHCR airlifts transporting much-needed relief items have arrived in Pakistan. Read More


