Climate Emergency in Pakistan-Flood 2022

Overview of Situation

The climate emergency in Pakistan is the point of main distress at all level. Though Pakistan is enlisted among those countries who are contributing less than 1% to global emission but the country is paying a huge prize of climate change and that is something entire world observed in recent floods in Pakistan. The unusual monsoon pattern in Pakistan caused severe devastation in many parts of the country. As per the available statistics, 116 districts are badly affected by flood and 80 districts are declared as calamity hit.

In addition, 1,460 health facilities and numerous education institutes were badly affected in various part of the country. The Government of Pakistan in collaboration with UN and humanitarian partners is leading the response activities in the flood affected areas. Of the PKR 70 billion (US\$319 million) earmarked to assist flood-affected people, the Benazir Income Support Programme (BISP) has already paid out at least PKR 22.22 billion (US\$101.24 million) to nearly 889,000 households as of 8 September. Beyond financial support, the Government at the national and provincial level is supporting people in need with in-kind support, bolstered by Pakistan's Armed Forces, which fly helicopter sorties for search-and-rescue activities and to deliver aid to people in areas inaccessible by land. The multi sectoral rapid need assessment related to damages is also started by the Government of Pakistan, UN and humanitarian partners in the disaster hit areas of Pakistan.

After launching the Flood Response Plan, UN also launched flash appeal on August 30th of US\$ 160.3 million to assist 5.2 million people in Pakistan and it is also scaling up its response to deliver aid under the challenging circumstances. The plan will complement the wider Government response activities such as the individual cash assistance provided through the BISP and focuses on supporting the most vulnerable communities with social and communal assistance.

On the emergency basis, Government of Pakistan established National Flood Response and Coordination Centre (NFRCC) on September 1st, comprising representatives of federal stakeholders, Provincial Governments, and the Pakistan Armed Forces, and aimed at better synergizing the national response to the monsoon rains and floods.


PHF member organizations started the response activities at the earliest in disaster hit areas and provided immediate rescue and relief activities that were related to shelter, food, NFIs, education, health and WASH. **34** member organizations of PHF (ACF, Tearfund, Muslim Aid, WHH, CESVI, HHRD, Concern Worldwide, Mercy Corps, MSF, Islamic Relief, Human Appeal, Handicap International, CRS, WaterAid, AKAH, HelpAge International, Helvetas, IMC, Qatar Charity, IRC, Care International, NCA, Relief International, Muslim Hands, Save the Children, SIF, CBM, AAR Japan, JEN, Oxfam, Solidar, Right to Play, CWSA and MdM) of PHF are present in 51 districts of Pakistan and reached out 1,073,242 people with the total financial volume of 20.14 million USD.

To provide the extensive response services, PHF member organizations are mobilizing resources on immediate basis and planning for 38.45 million USD to better provide services in flood hit areas.



"I have seen many humanitarian disasters in the world, but I have never seen climate carnage on this scale. I have simply no words to describe what I have seen today: a flooded area that is three times the total area of my own country, Portugal," Mr. Guterres told reporters as he concluded his field visits. Pakistan is facing the worst consequences of the climate crisis thanks in part to the actions of the developed world, Finance Minister Miftah Ismail said, as the country battles the worst floods in its history. "Pakistan is one of the worst-affected countries by climate change. We have, as you know, a very, very small carbon footprint, we don't really produce carbon dioxide and other harmful gases," Ismail told CNBC's "Street Signs Asia" on Monday. Read More

continues suffer Pakistan to from catastrophic flooding. Around one-third of the country remains underwater, and most of the 33 million people affected by the disaster have yet to receive assistance. But the crisis could still get worse: On Tuesday, the retaining wall of Pakistan's largest lake gave way under rising water levels, imperiling communities downstream. More monsoon rains are expected in the coming weeks. Read More

Pregnant women in Pakistan left at lurch as floods wash away maternal healthcare: Women and girls are more vulnerable than men and boys in times of calamity. Even more so when they are from the low- or no-income section of society. These women and girls are given least priority when it comes to rescue, relief and rehabilitation. Therefore, they are the most exposed to devastation. *Read More*

Pakistan has urged the United Nations Children Fund, UNICEF, for help in re-opening schools in old and new temporary locations in flood-devastated areas, as the UN agency's executive board adopted a \$900 million, 4-year (2023 to 2027) country programme aimed at the uplift of the country's 80 million children. Speaking at the board's meeting, Ambassador Munir Akram also assistance in healthcare-prevention of waterborne and communicable diseases immunization of children: and ensuring food security by providing nutrition for children with the view to provide relief. The UN health agency stressed the urgent need to provide adequate medical care and supplies, including support for mental health care, and reported that its staff on the ground are working to identify and detect possible disease outbreaks for immediate attention, although access to many disaster sites is still very difficult. The Pakistan Country Director of the World Food Programme (WFP) also highlighted the logistical challenges posed by the floods in getting life-saving assistance to the affected population in a country where many people were in need of help even before the disaster. As of September 13th, 2022, NDMA has reported 1481 deaths, 12748 injured, and 1.7 million house destroyed due to an ongoing spell of heavy monsoon rainfall.

Pakistan Floods 2022 Humanity First - Situation Update 02 | 09 September 2022

For many months, above average rainfall has led to unprecedented flooding across much of Pakistan. Across the country, 80 districts have been declared as 'calamity hit' covering a massive area from Balochistan and Sindh in the south, to Gilgit and KPK in the north. Over 1.7 million homes have now been damaged of which over 560k have been totally destroyed, and in many cases, washed away. *Read more*

The plan focuses on the needs of 5.2 million people and scaling up assistance in critical sectors. As climate shocks become more frequent in Pakistan, ramping up prevention and preparedness measures to avert, minimize and respond to the impacts of climate change and disaster-related displacement remains critical. <u>Read More</u>
