Climate Emergency in Pakistan-Flood 2022

Overview of Situation

As according to the reports of NDMA, WFP and UNOCHA

The climate emergency in Pakistan is the point of main distress at all level . Though Pakistan is enlisted among those countries who are contributing less than 1% to global emission but the country is paying a huge prize of climate change and that is something entire world observed in recent floods in Pakistan. The unusual monsoon pattern in Pakistan caused severe devastation in many parts of the country. A total of 116 districts are badly affected by flood and 80 districts are declared as calamity hit. As per the latest statistics of NDMA, 1638 people are died and 12865 are badly injured and numerous houses, bridges, health facilities, schools, infrastructure, roads and bridges were badly destroyed in flood hit areas of Pakistan.

The floods have exacerbated previously high levels of food insecurity and malnutrition for millions of people. Prior to the floods, multiple shocks, including high food and fuel prices, drought, livestock diseases, and loss of incomegenerating opportunities due to the COVID-19 pandemic had already driven increasing food insecurity in Balochistan, KP and Sindh provinces.

Based on the comparison of satellite data between 1-7 and 8-14 September, the overall flood situation appears to be decreasing. Receding floodwaters in 1,700 km² of lands in Balochistan, 3,900 km² in Punjab, and 850 km² in Sindh were observed. This notwithstanding, some 7.9 million people are reportedly displaced, including some 598,000 people living in relief camps.

At least 1,638 people (including 588 children and 332 women) have died and 12,865 have been injured since 14 June 2022. With over 1,200 medical facilities marooned in flood water, malaria and diarrhoea are spreading fast in Sindh. 318 people have died from water-borne diseases since 1 July, including gastroenteritis, diarrhoea, and malaria, in flood-hit areas of Sindh, the most heavily affected province.

The number of damaged and destroyed houses in Pakistan now exceeds 2 million, with over 1.2 million houses damaged and over 805,000 houses destroyed as of 23 September. The National Disaster Management Authority (NDMA) has recorded over 1,600 deaths and more than 12,850 injuries since mid-June, including 579 children killed and over 4,000 children injured. Some 7.9 million people are reportedly displaced due to the heavy rains and floods, including some 598,000 people who are living in relief camps, according to reports by the respective Provincial Disaster Management Authority (PDMA) of the affected provinces. Reports indicate that more than 5,000 schools are currently being used to host displaced populations, while an estimated 23,900 schools have been damaged.

Government of Pakistan established an ad hoc coordination structure NFRCC(National Flood Response and Coordination Centre) which is working very efficiently from September 1st and taking on board all relevant stakeholders on regular basis to update about response efforts at all levels. PHF member organizations started the response activities at the earliest in disaster hit areas and provided immediate rescue and relief activities that were related to shelter, food, NFIs, education, health and WASH. 34 member organizations of PHF (ACF, Tearfund, Muslim Aid, WHH, CESVI, HHRD, Concern Worldwide, Mercy Corps, MSF, Islamic Relief, Human Appeal, Handicap International, CRS, WaterAid, AKAH, HelpAge International, Helvetas, IMC, Qatar Charity, IRC, Care International, NCA, Relief International, Muslim Hands, Save the Children, SIF, CBM, AAR Japan, JEN, Oxfam, Solidar, Right to Play, CWSA and MdM) of PHF are present in 55 districts of Pakistan and reached out 1,74,0856 people with the total financial volume of 20.14 million USD.

BUZZ OF THE WEEK



Countries on the front lines of the climate crisis are fed up with Pakistan, where devastating floods this month engulfed large swaths of the country, killing more than 1,500 people and causing damage estimated at \$30 billion, leading the nations demanding compensations for climate change effects. Prime Minister Mr. Shehbaz Sharif, while addressing the annual gathering of world leaders at the United Nations on Friday *Read More*

The catchphrase "water is life" took on a deeper meaning in 2022 as floods submerged two-thirds of Pakistan, affecting more than 33 million people, displacing tens of millions and killing 1,400 people. While the Indus River helped Pakistan's rural prosperity grow over generations, the frequency and intensity of floods have been steadily increasing in recent decades. More than 13 floods have occurred in Pakistan since 1992— and each flood has killed and displaced hundreds of thousands of people. *Read More*

Mr. Antonio Guterres, United Nations Chief, has urged developed countries to tax windfall profits of fossil fuel companies and use the money to help countries facing a climate crisis. No other country comes even close to Pakistan in the scale of devastation due to the floods in terms of fatalities, in terms of loss of residence, and in terms of loss of livelihood with the assessment placing the sum required for rescue and relief followed by rehabilitation at over 15 billion dollars. *Read More*

Senior leader Pakistan Muslim League-Nawaz (PML-N) Lt Gen (Retd) Abdul Qayyum said on Sunday that climate change was a threat and the world must recognize Pakistan sacrifices. The developed countries of the world were responsible for the destruction caused by climate change as they had been emitting large amounts of greenhouse gases, but the price was paid by developing countries like Pakistan, he said. <u>Read More</u>

EU Commission President Ms. Ursala Von Der Leyen held a meeting with Prime Minister Shehbaz on the sidelines of the 77th session of the United National General Assembly (UNGA) in New York as she expressed grief over the loss of lives in ravaging floods in the country and pledged "new humanitarian aid in the coming weeks". The United Nations and the Pakistani government had also issued a flash appeal on Tuesday for \$160 million to help the country cope with catastrophic floods. Read More

The latest "Kindness Train" carrying humanitarian aid to disaster-hit Pakistan departed from Türkiye's northwestern Kocaeli province, local media reported on Sunday.

The 12th train is loaded with humanitarian aid materials prepared with the support of nongovernmental organizations (NGOs) under the coordination of the Disaster and Emergency Management Authority (AFAD). <u>Read More</u>

International humanitarian and UNHRC envoy, Ms. Angelina Jolie with the team of the global humanitarian organization, International Rescue Committee (IRC) arrived in Pakistan on Tuesday, on her visit to flood-ravaged areas of Pakistan, ARY news reported. According to the details, Jolie visited the flood-hit region of Dadu in Sindh via boat to meet the flood-affected women and spoke to them about their needs. Moreover, Jolie will "highlight the need for urgent support for the Pakistani people and long-term solutions to address the multiplying crises of climate change, human displacement and protracted insecurity" witnessed on a global level. *Read More*

UNICEF Pakistan Humanitarian Situation Report No. 3 (Floods) - 20 September 2022

Rainfall equivalent to nearly 3 to 5 times the national 30-year average has covered up to one-third of Pakistan with water and wreaked havoc. The death toll is over 1,500 and rising with 552 children among the dead and some 33 million people affected.

The second wave of the disaster is hitting hard with outbreaks of watery diarrhoea, typhoid and malaria now increasing rapidly as millions of people sleep in temporary shelters or in the open near stagnating water. *Read more*



Islamic Relief's Pakistan Floods Response 2022 (24 September, 2022)

2022 monsoon rains have been catastrophic, triggering waves of displacement and destruction beyond imagination and estimations. The sufferings on the other hand are incalculable as the country continues to bear the climate cost. With 190 percent more rains, the damages will take years to rebuild. *Read more*

Severe monsoon weather since mid-June 2022 has affected up to 33 million people in the country. As of 6 September 2022, 81 districts have been officially declared as "calamity-hit" and 40 districts declared as "flood-affected". Among 81 districts declared calamity, 32 districts are located in Balochistan Province, 23 districts are located in Sindh Province, 17 districts are located in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Province, 6 districts are located in Gilgit Baltistan Province, and 3 districts are located in Punjab Province. *Read more*



UNHCR Regional Bureau for Asia and Pacific (RBAP): Flash Update #2 on Pakistan Floods as of 16 September 2022

UNHCR is supporting the government-led flood response alongside several national and international actors. An estimated 800,000 refugees are hosted in more than 40 'calamity hit' districts.

- Four 'calamity-hit' districts in Balochistan, Khyber Pakhtunkhwa and Sindh provinces host the highest number of refugees.
- So far, UNHCR has delivered 950,000 life-saving supplies to authorities for distribution. <u>Read more</u>
