Amidst these difficult times, Save the Children is already delivering an extensive response in Sindh, KP, and Balochistan to address the immediate survival needs in worst-hit districts, and now progressing toward recovery, rehabilitation, and reconstruction to minimize the adverse effects of flooding on education, health, nutrition, WASH, food security, and livelihoods of children, women and their families. As of 15th February 2023, Save the Children has reached more than 228,432 people, including more than 115,498 children through the life-saving activities under flood response 2022

#### Remembering the Human in Humanitarian



Madina, a mother to five children and pregnant with another saw her house, cattle, and food stock washed away, with no foreseeable income, huddled in her damaged house, worried about her five children, one of whom is quite sick, and constantly worried about the food, approaching winter and the future of her family. She was pale due to anemia and often felt dizzy when she got up due to low hemoglobin. "I was five months pregnant when the flood water gushed, and nonstop rain was striking our village in Lasbela".

Upon recalling her experience of a flood, Madina said, "I was doing my house chores when I heard one my neighbor shouting and coming to take me to highland as my husband was out on his work. My mother came a long us. We were all concerned about the situation, especially my husband, who had not returned home that night. That was the most difficult night of my life; our house was completely destroyed by floodwaters, and my husband was stranded in another part of Lasbela. We were all on the main highway, where we obtained tents, food items, clothes and other useful, items from local organizations, where we stayed for at least five days".

Days after her husband returned, Madina breathe a sigh of relief. During this time period, Madina was facing some contractions. She visited a Basic Health Unit where she came to know her hemoglobin was low. During this difficult phase, where bringing food to the table was an issue, Madina's family was identified for multipurpose cash assistance.

On the day of the MPCA distribution, she took a local bus to the distribution camp in Bela and received PKR 15,000 (67 USD). She was overjoyed that she would be able to deliver her baby in a safe environment and get food on the table for her young kids.

Madina was full of enthusiasm at the back of a successful operation and was so delighted of her newborn that she is a blessing to their family Madina called the IRC team by herself and shared her motivational story while the team were interviewing MPCA recipients. She also requested that a photo be taken with her newborn so that it could be published with her story. Madina expressed her gratitude to the IRC team in person as well because she was overjoyed to connect with IRC's MPCA.

# Pakistan: Floods response update, February 2023

Rural communities of Pakistan were among the hardest hit by the devastating floods of June-August 2022. The disaster wiped out 1.7 million hectares of agricultural land and 800 000 heads of livestock, pushing millions of rural households into poverty and food insecurity. Around 14.6 million people are in need of food security and agricultural assistance. Restoring the livelihoods and food production of rural households is fundamental to the humanitarian response. The document provides an overview of the ongoing response of the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations in line with national priorities and the revised floods response plan .Read more

#### UNDP Pakistan holds training on responsible reporting on climate change and GLOFs for journalists in Khyber Paktunkhwa

Heavy rains and a combination of riverine, urban and flash flooding have led to an unprecedented climate-induced disaster in Pakistan since June 2022, causing widespread fatalities, killing livestock, and damaging and destroying public and private infrastructure across the country. Raininduced landslides and floods have also damaged agricultural land and forests, impacting local ecosystems. 84 districts nationwide have been notified as 'calamity hit' by the Government of Pakistan, mainly in Balochistan (32 districts), Sindh (23 districts) and Khyber Pakhtunkhwa (17 districts).

# WFP Pakistan Country Brief, January 2023

Since August 2022, WFP has provided 3.35 million flood affected people in Balochistan, Khyber Pakhtunkhwa (KP), Punjab, and Sindh provinces with 77,445 mt of in-kind food and US\$14.8 million in Cash-based Transfers (CBT). Under WFP's Blanket Supplementary Feeding Programme, 505,735 pregnant and lactating women (PLW) and children aged 6-23 months received unconditional assistance and Specialized Nutritious Foods (SNF). WFP faces a shortfall of US\$107 million for its ongoing flood response. Despite persistent humanitarian needs, WFP has been compelled to scale down its assistance from mid-February 2023.t.
